



As a young man visiting the Kennedy Space Center with a friend, Ummarid "Tony" Eitharong (Thai-born American, b. 1952) remarked of an impressive wall mural, "I bet I could draw that." Winning that bet was the genesis of a long and successful career in art.



Never content, Eitharong consistently asks himself, "What's next?" "What if I try this?" "What if I change that?" His artistic evolution has produced three distinct bodies of work: realistic yet expressive pencil portraits in the 1970s and 1980s, his Military Industrial Art (M.I.A.) series of mixed-media assemblages in the 1990s and 2000s, and for the last 15 years, his explosively colorful abstract acrylic paintings. He has won several awards in each style, but sales and accolades do not stifle that passion to grow, transform and respond to an ever-changing world. Coming full circle, Eitharong did "draw that," having just completed a major 30-foot mural project at the University of Tampa.

Opening in the Edith-Marie Gallery, "What If Eye" will present a retrospective of Eitharong's work, encapsulating every style he has endeavored. It will be a history of the artist that is comprehensive, at least until he encounters his next "What if?".

Framing Tokyo: Joel Bustamante's Architectural Photography

Opening in the Balcony Gallery for Florida Artists, see 30 black-and-white and color photographs by Joel Bustamante (Venezuela, b. 1949).

Born in Caracas, Venezuela, Bustamante enjoyed an international education early in his career. He graduated from The Art Institute of Fort Lauderdale while working in the college's photography department. Bustamante owned and operated an advertising agency in Caracas for a decade before graduating with a master's degree in architectural photography from Tokyo-based Nihon University. During that time, he created a photo exposé of the amazing modern architecture in Japan from the 1970s through the 1980s, capped by the 1985 one-of-akind structures erected for the World's Fair in Tsukuba Science City, located north of Tokyo. The majority of the 30 photographs included in the exhibition are black-and-white with a few color works.




